LANGUAGE SPOT

- Asking short and gentle question
- Can you tell me *what/who+noun+verb?*
- What's your surname/ family name?
- Can you tell me what your surname/family name?
- *Remove words to make questions shorter.*
- What's your first name? your first name?
- Have you any other names?(And) any other names?
- Two types of questions:
- yes/no questions and wh-question
- Do/Does +subject +infinitive
 Do you feel any pain in your abdomen?
- ✤ Present simple of be +subject

Is there any one we can contact for you?

- ✤ = Can +subject+ infinitive
 - Can you feel your legs?

Wh questions(for more information)

- What, which, how much, how many can be followed by a noun.
- -Which doctor did you speak to?
- -How much pain are you in ?
- -What.....like? (to describe)
- -What is the pain like?
- Not What's the pain likes?


• Can you tell me? Or Can you describe....?

Can you tell me where it hurts?

- **Not** Can you tell me where does it hurt?
- With both yes /no question and wh question we use
- Present simple or present continuous to talk about present situation.
- Present perfect or present perfect continuous to talk about a situation that began in the past and which continues up to the present .

o <u>Present Simple</u>

- I feel better.
- I get these headaches in the morning.

o <u>Present continuous</u>

- His blood pressure's rising.
- I'm having difficulty breathing.
- I'm seeing a physiotherapist next Wednesday.
- I've got a pain in my chest. (moment of speaking)

EXERCISE

- You overheard this short question. Write a direct and a gentle question for each to make it clear what the speaker meant. EXAMPLE
 - What's your address?
 - Can you tell me what your address is?





- At high school and at university, you'll often be told to write a specific type of essay, but you might also just be given prompts.
- Look for keywords in these prompts that suggest a certain approach: The word "explain" suggests you should write an expository essay, while the word "describe" implies a descriptive essay. An argumentative essay might be prompted with the word "assess" or "argue."
